Mr. Schommer explained the consultant went out to bid for energy suppliers. Two companies came in with bids, Energy Harbor and Dynegy. Dynegy had no savings. Blended rates with energy Harbor were locked in, effective by the October bill. He added the latest date to opt out of this program will be August 25. City residences could opt back in if they opted out originally with no cost or cancellation fee.

CITY MANAGER REPORT:

Mr. Schommer updated on the new system for code enforcement and permitting. The city has 97 total violations entered in the system, some complaints and some through proactive enforcement in the community. Of the 97 there are 73 that have gained compliance, providing about 75% of issues resolving with repair or compliance. There are currently 18 open violations. The City has received 140 permits, the majority of which for fences, accessary buildings, pools, new construction and a variety of other items. Total revenue for permitting year-to-date is almost \$7,000.00.

He also provided comments about softening the water system. Mr. Schommer noted there are a few steps that could be taken, including looking into a consultant to identify what a system and process would be to apply water softening to our system and cost. A system softening project is costly and the City would need debt financing to accomplish it. Mr. Schommer noted the water softening has nothing to do with the health and cleanliness of the water, it is a personal preference. The city water is hard but is clean. Wells are routinely tested by the EPA.

Mr. Schommer noted the next newsletter will be hitting mailboxes August 1, 2022. He thanked Michaela for putting this Newsletter together.

Mr. Schommer updated the two RFP currently issued; Outdoor warning sirens bid due (August 5) and the Lower Hillside drainage improvement bid due (August 12).

He noted there are six qualified captain applicants that are currently being reviewed.

He noted a quote was received to get an engineered set of drawings for the Museum repairs. This is currently being reviewed and identifying this cost for all the foundation repairs to the Museum.

Mayor Schweller asks if council has anything further.

Mr. Greenwood asks Mr. Schommer about the projects people get involved with, have they had any issues with the Greene County Inspection being slow. Mr. Schommer states the workflow through the building department is involved and can take some time. A lot of projects and limited staff contributes to this.

Mr. Hoke asked about the property demolition at 100 E Franklin St and the rebuilding process. Mr. Schommer states the developer came in and they are finalizing the drawings. Hopefully soon we will receive the drawing submitted and site approval will be done.

Mrs. Middlestetter offered thanks to our service department. She requested getting rid of gravel at the library due to a tripping hazard and they had this completed in 2 days. Great work.

Mr. Greenwood states he stopped by a lemonade stand on Sugar Run and Franklin, two young men, Quinn Anderson and Keegan Painter were running it. Their enthusiasm and lemonade were great. Our City Staff participated also.

Mayor Schweller gives his condolences to the family and friends of Deputy Yates who gave his life in the line of duty.
